My research covers both labour economics and energy economics, and currently I work as a Research Fellow at the Energy Centre, based at the University of Auckland Business School.

I received my PhD in Economics from The University of Auckland in 2015. My PhD study involves econometric modelling of immigration, data analysis, and policy analysis. One original aspect of my PhD research is its use of panel data analyses to investigate the match between education and occupation and the resulting earnings effects and upward career mobility, after controlling for individual heterogeneity.

My subsequent applied research has also made a significant contribution in the field of energy economics by initiating the spatial econometrics modelling design to analyse the spill-over effects of wind generation on electricity price. I work jointly with Al Sharp on energy efficiency, with a special focus on energy use in New Zealand's industrial and Trade, Primary Industry, and Services Sectors.

I was a Lecturer in the Economics Department at the Auckland University of Technology in 2015. From 2011 to 2014, I tutored papers on Labour Economics, Business Economics and Economics for Managers at The University of Auckland.
